

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

1 Thessalonians 5:16–18

There is some debate about the best interpretation of the verses above. In particular, there are those who would suggest that when we are exhorted to "give thanks in **all** circumstances," we are being told to give thanks *for* even those things that seem bitter and tragic to us, while others suggest that we are being encouraged to find *something* to give thanks for even when our circumstances seem desperate.

I think I get where some people might say we should give thanks *for* even the worst things that come our way. In my mind, I can make a case that we—being mortal and of limited insight into what the future holds and how God might be working even now to bring good from the worst possible circumstances—may be acting in a faithful manner when we give God thanks even for the bad stuff.

It's like we're saying, "God, I don't know how these circumstances can possibly be a part of your plan for bringing your kingdom to this earth, but I will choose to trust you even more than I trust my feelings, my perceptions, and my judgments of what is worthy of thanks and what isn't.

But, I tend to fall toward the latter interpretation. To me it seems like it would be a rejection of our truth to give thanks for things that bring pain to ourselves or others. It seems like a form of denial to put a false smile on our faces and thank God for devastating storms and dour news from the doctor or a bleak outlook for our loved ones.

That being said, I believe that even when we are in times that might be characterized as being downhearted, there is a real value to finding the good spots and focusing on them as much as possible. I say this because I know how easy it is for us to allow the negative things to overwhelm us to the point where we no longer see *any* good, and our whole lives can become consumed by the downward spiral of darkness.

When, in spite of our grief, for example, we take a moment to give thanks for the kindness of our friends who have been attempting to support us, we are not denying our grief (or even our anger with God) for the loss of our loved one, but allowing an honest balance in our lives. Sometimes bad things happen in life, and we react through the intelligence and emotions that God has given us—we react with fears and tears and anger and frustration—and it seems to me that God has created us in such a way that it's pretty natural for us to do so.

But when we allow that which is negative in our lives to poison the well of our souls to the point that we no longer see *any* good, then we are closing our eyes to reality just as surely as those who would call a bad thing good and pretend to be thankful for that which they can only know as evil.

This month, we will celebrate Thanksgiving. I know this is considered a secular holiday, but there is something very right about having a day set aside to remind us to be thankful.

During the pandemic, it has been very easy to fall into a kind of tunnel vision in which we have pretty much focused *only* on the numbers of those who have been infected, or hospitalized, or died. It's been easy to focus on our losses and our anger at those who we think have restricted our freedoms. It's been easier to think of the

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things we can't do and can't enjoy, the peace and hope and joy that we have set aside than to open our minds to that which has been potentially good.

During this time when we may be transitioning back into something like a new normal, there are some who are struggling with lingering fears and residual anger, a kind of paranoid tendency to look over our shoulder and see potential new dangers and traumas lurking in every shadow.

My prayer for us during this season is that we will find a release in offering our heartfelt thanks for that which is worthy of thanks. That we will intentionally seek to restore the balance in our lives as we remember God's goodness—and name it and claim it. And perhaps we will find that every offering of thanks we raise to God is like lighting a candle in our darkness, and the more candles we light, the brighter our lives become—and the more light we have to share with others. Amen.

Council Capsule By Claudia Zimmerman

Congregational Council meeting on Sunday, October 9, 2022. The Capsule is a condensed summary of Council business. Council members attend in person or online.

Revive – The ELCA will offer a new "Congregational Vitality Training" program that will overlap the objectives for REVIVE. The programs will be merged, with the first emphasis on Evangelism.

Narthex – Stacking chairs for the tables need to be purchased and the gold chairs reupholstered. New stacking chairs might be considered for the Fellowship Hall when ordering.

Communications – Website improvements still are not finished. They were expected to be working before the end of June and to be more user-friendly. A simple letterhead style logo is being designed for general use. The online calendar is up-to-date with information available, but more specific information is needed. The online sign-up system for volunteers was discussed, but overlap issues experienced with sign-up sheet would have to be dealt with. A bulletin board in the Narthex near the Lending Library will be used for event information.

Congregational Life – The Second Best Sale will be from 9 am to 5 pm on Friday, Oct. 28 and from 9 am to noon on Saturday, Oct. 29. The Ice Cream Social / Band Concert went well, with about 40 people in attendance and around \$500 donated to NECM. The Angel Tree and Mitten Tree will go up in the Narthex on November 1.

Congregational Care – Cards continue to go out. A goal is to work toward visitations to shut-ins. An updated list is needed.

Discipleship – A trip to Robinette's Orchard was planned for October 16 and Halloween's Trunk-or-Treat on October 30 will be with Northlawn United Methodist Church on Fuller Avenue in their parking area from 4 to 6 pm.

Work times to make crafts is planned for November to prepare for the Christmas Bazaar to be held December 11 and 18 in the Narthex.

Facilities – A proposal for repair of the deteriorating angled support beams has been requested. The bees in the patio area have been taken care of.

Finances – Offering donations have been good recently. Some major bills for insurance and technology updates may require a transfer of funds.

Worship and Music – We welcome Jonathan Lonsway, who will be directing Bell Choir as well as playing the organ for the 8:30 service. Director of Music Sharon TerBeek's last services are the Sunday worship service December 18 and the Christmas Eve Service. Jess Luiz will take over plans for services as Worship Coordinator. Apianist for the Praise Band will be sought.

Stewardship – Time and Talent volunteer sheets return to their former use this year, and there will be no Stewardship luncheon as there will be a 70th Anniversary luncheon on November 20.




If you are a voting member of Faith Lutheran, we would love to have you stay for the meeting immediately following the 10 am worship service.
